

I still can't believe how quickly this year is going by! Before we know it, Thanksgiving and Christmas will be with us. But before that happens, something special takes place that is always very well attended: the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, or as we commonly call it, All Souls' Day, less than one month away.

As we are so very much aware, we cannot celebrate this day as we have in the past with an evening Mass. This year we will have two opportunities to participate in All Souls' Day. I will be recording the All Souls' Mass that will be found on our webpage on November 2. At this recorded Mass, the names of all those from our parish who have died during the last year will be read aloud. I chose to record this Mass so that we could have the names appear as they are read.

On All Soul's Day itself, there will be three brief, outdoor prayer services. at 5 pm, 6 pm and 7 pm. The Knights of Columbus will be selling luminaries that will be on display at these prayer services. Please submit the form below if you'd like to order a luminary for your loved ones.





# The Vintner and His Crop

Wine has evolved over the centuries as an important part of life, culture, and diet. As an enduring cultural symbol, it's prominence in both the Old and New Testaments denotes the celebration of life. Its role has changed in recent decades from an important source of nutrition to a cultural complement to food and an invitation to sociability.

Wine frames the life of Jesus in His ministry to His brothers and sisters. His ministry on Earth begins with the turning of water into wine at the wedding at Cana and continues with wine becoming His Precious Blood along with his Body -- not only at the Last Supper, but at a most sacred part of our Christian faith, the Eucharistic celebration in the Mass. This life-giving nourishment keeps us as faithful followers of the life of Christ.

Our readings from both Isaiah and Matthew this weekend highlight the prominence that wine takes in scripture as a celebration of life. In Isaiah, God as the vintner makes every provision for a successful crop: He clears the soil, builds a watchtower to protect the crop, and places a

In anticipation of the harvest, He builds a wine press to transform the grapes into fine wine. But yet, even with all this effort, the crop turns wild and unfit for the wine for which the vintner had hoped. The parable Jesus uses in Matthew carries Isaiah's story further by emphasizing that God repeatedly sends His servants,



and then the His own son, to ensure a successful crop but the Son is ultimately killed.

These readings focus on God's abundant love of His people and His never ending attempts to prepare for a crop which is a cause for celebration. However, the crop doesn't always develop as hoped. Meticulous preparation and repeated attempts to provide a successful harvest is oftentimes thwarted by our failure to follow God's commands.

God has given us all the tools we need to reap a successful life for ourselves and others. However, our rejection of His work and preparation meets with failure sometimes. Even giving us His Son who was rejected and killed. Today God continues to work in guiding His people through the example of Christ. He gives us every opportunity to reap a bountiful harvest, sweet and flavorful. As we celebrate the life of Christ, we work the vineyard to ensure a fine crop for others and for us through all eternity.

- Metal folding chairs: Qty. 60




#### PRAYER OF ST. FRANCIS / ORACIÓN DE SAN FRANCISCO (CONT 2)
