

A letter from Fr. Dillon

Dear Parishioners,

Last weekend at Mass, many commented on the odor of natural gas as they entered the church. As of Tuesday morning, here is an update: Southern Connecticut Gas has been here and determined that all is well with the gas meter and pipe fittings. The device that registers the presence of gas detected none. Despite that, the aroma is still present.

Previously, on Monday afternoon, a service technician looked at the church heating unit, which is on the roof over the hallway that leads to the restrooms. His initial inspection indicated that there were no cracks or other physical problems with the heating unit. He returned on Tuesday morning and said we are smelling "exhaust," not natural gas. He made an adjustment to the gas flow with the hope that this solves the problem. If not, we will have him come back.

Carbon dioxide sensors will be installed in the church as an added precaution. If the problem persists, I will cancel Masses as needed. Any information about Mass cancellation may be found on our Facebook and website, as well as a posting on the church doors. Warm weather is forecasted for this weekend so heat will not be

Contemplation and Preparation

Our readings this weekend seem to focus on things that seem to have no practical help for everyday life. One cannot take these readings and apply them directly to what may be going on in our life right now. They cannot cure our anxiety over health and family issues; they cannot directly change the political situation in our coun-

try; nor do they offer solutions as we head into the holidays and another winter of restrictions of contact with family, friends and travel. We are all exhausted with the thought that we will probably lose a year or more of our lives under pandemic restrictions.

What these readings *do* give us is advice in this time of trial and hope for the future. A message that with prayer, God's presence will be revealed and give us the lasting relief that He is with us and has not abandoned us. We need to realize that God is always present to us. It is in our reaching out to Him, through prayer, that He makes His presence known. Through prayer and contemplation of God's work, we obtain an understanding of Him and His unending presence in our lives. (*Prov 9:10*)

As we go through life we wonder about our future here on Earth and what will happen after death. Awareness of His creative splendor in the beauty of the Autumn landscape and the gift of the people we love helps us to begin to understand God's magnificent presence.

Our first reading today says that Wisdom is "resplendent and unfading." The brightness and the strength of wisdom never fades, it never loses its strength. Wisdom is never ending; it never changes but its presence remains forever in its magnificence.

Scripture uses Wisdom as a metaphor for God. As we use wisdom in life to navigate to do what is right, wisdom becomes the presence of God guiding and preparing us for the reward of the life-giving sacrifice of Jesus. "The souls of the just are in the hands of God." (*Wis 3:1*)

Jesus' parable today tells a story of the need for knowledge of God's hand in the creative process of everything and preparation for His receiving us when we leave this life on Earth. While we await His coming, we should not idly sit by. Preparing for Jesus'

coming takes prayer, thought and preparation. Understanding God and His ways should occupy our life through prayer and thought of God's hand in what has happened in our life and the world around us.

Without this preparation, as today's story tells us, we may hear the Lord say to us "we do not know you." God is actively present in every moment and breath that we take. It is only through our acknowledging Him that we come to understand His ways and make preparation of His call to Eternal life for us.




