Baptism: Rich in Graces

A letter from Fr. Dillon

Dear Parishioners,

Today, we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord and every time I think about this celebration, it reminds me to be more aware of my own baptism and the sacramental life that is found in the Church. I believe that we all should know the date of our baptism; for me, it took place on August 5, exactly two weeks after I was born. Our baptismal anniversary is a day that should be celebrated for many wonderful things happened to us: we were set free from original sin, received the gift of the Holy Spirit, claimed by Christ as one of His own, became a new creation in Christ, received the gift of faith, became members of the Church and we received our call to live a life of holiness. All of that occurred through the words spoken and a few simple gestures: the pouring of water over our heads and the anointing with sacred oils of our chest and head.

Unfortunately, I think so much of this has been lost to many members of the Church. Too often the focus of baptism is not on what happens in church, but the party that occurs afterward. I've come to the conclusion that for many, Baptism — as well as First Holy Communion and Confirmation — are seen as "rites of passage" that Catholics do and not as an encounter with Christ, the living God, that transforms us and brings us into an intimate union with Jesus.

I offer all of this

today not to be a "downer" or pessimistic, but as a challenge for all of us, myself included, to find ways to better teach and inform others in and outside the Church of the great "riches" and grace that God has in all of the sacramental moments in our lives: not just the sacraments that we receive once, but the sacraments that we receive frequently as well.

For many people, especially the homebound, the pandemic has been a time of great hunger for the Eucharist. The homebound miss not being able to receive Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament and feel incomplete in their relationship with the Lord. I have heard many times how our homebound have been asking those who visit them when they can receive Holy Communion again; unfortunately, the answer is when the wearing of masks is no longer necessary. We can't take the chance that one of our parishioners may contract COVID from someone they visit or bring it into someone's home.

I'm hoping that we do take up the "challenge" to increase our own knowledge about the sacraments, gain a deeper appreciation of them, and bring this knowledge and appreciation to others.

The Baptism of Jesus


Jesus, Mary, and Joseph were raised in the Jewish faith and we see in our Gospels that they followed Jewish Law. We hear of the Holy Family's encounter with Simeon as Jesus is brought to the Temple when he was 40 days old to complete Mary's ritual purification after childbirth, and to *present* their firstborn son.

Purification and atonement for sins is important in the life of a Jewish person and they observe Yom Kippur to atone for their sins. Catholics have the

Sacrament of Penance and our Penitential Rite at the beginning of Mass. In fact, many religions have an observance or ritual for God's forgiveness of sins. For the Jewish people in the first century, in order to worship God in the Temple, purification was required to cleanse them from sin.

John the Baptist was a preacher and prophet. His message to the Jewish people was proclaiming the coming of the Messiah. He used the purification process as a central part of his message -- not only to prepare people for worship in the Temple, but also to announce God's coming as the prophets of the Old Testament foretold. However, John was determined to make it clear to people that "someone after him would come that was greater than he."

If Jesus was both human and divine, why did He need to be baptized? It is a question asked by many of us when we hear this Gospel. Tradition tells us that Jesus was approximately 30 years old when He began his public ministry. His entire life was to show obedience to the will of the Father. As with any person embarking on their adult life, there are choices to be made. Jesus was Son of God and Son of Man. As Son of God, He was to be an example of obedience to all people. As Son of Man, He was tempted and



suffered in the details of life on Earth, as all of us do. His need for Baptism was not only obedience to God's plan but to be an example for all humans; to seek God's forgiveness from the impurities of life; the things we do and fail to do.

Jesus also recognizes the power of the Holy Spirit in the purification process. As Jesus made His choice to be baptized by John and obedient to God's plan, the Holy Spirit descended, "like a dove," a sign of peace, and proclaims, "You are my Son. On you my favor rests."

Our Baptism is not just a purification and cleansing but a call to discipleship in proclaiming the Good News. In Jesus' divinity and humanity, He shows us an example of life. The Holy Spirit guides us through life to continue our journey of faith following Jesus' example.

"...This Word of God proclaimed in the liturgy possesses a special sacramental power to bring about in us what it proclaims. ... How, then, do we respond to this wonderful gift of God's Word? We respond in word and song, in posture and gesture, in silent meditation and, most important of all, by **listening attentively** to that Word as it is proclaimed." -- General Instruction of the Roman Missal, United States Catholic Conference of Bishops.

Second Reading — God anointed him with the Holy Spirit (Acts 10:34-38) or 1 John 5:1-9.

(Mark 1:7-11).

The Sign of the Cross

At the beginning of our prayer, we make the sign of the cross together. This sign, simple and powerful, operates on many levels. We trace the sign of the cross over our bodies, reminding ourselves that the cross of Christ has become our source of resurrection, life, and grace. With this sign, we also profess our faith in the Trinity: the presider does not say "in the *names*," but "in the *name* of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit"—three persons, one God.

The sign of the cross is also a baptismal reminder, for every sign of the cross echoes the words spoken over us at our baptism, which marked our entry into the saving mystery of Christ. This many-layered sign is also our primary sign of blessing: the cross is traced over people, places, and things upon which we ask God to impart divine benediction.

In blessing ourselves with the sign of the cross at the beginning of Mass, we acknowledge the mystery that has gathered us together: that Christ, the crucified and risen One, is living, and that we are members of his Body. Our response, our Amen, is our *yes* to all this, our first profession of faith.
