

The Anointing of the Sick

A letter from Fr. Dillon

Dear Parishioners,

This week, let's explore the sacrament that we associate with the end of life: The Annointing of the Sick. This is really a three-part sacrament that consists of: The Anointing of the Sick, Viaticum and The Commendation of the Dying.

This sacrament is not reserved just for those who are dying. We used to refer to it as Extreme Unction or Last Rites and this helped establish a mind-set that this is the only time the anointing may occur. The Anointing of the Sick is also available to, as the wording says, those who are sick as a way to bring the presence of God to them in their suffering.

There are also prayers for those who are elderly. As we know, the elderly often face many health challenges so the sacrament, again, is there to bring the presence of God to this stage of their life.

A final provision for the Anointing of the Sick is for those who will be undergoing surgery. I received the Anointing of the Sick when I broke my ankle because I wanted the protection of the Lord with me while I was being treated.

Viaticum means "food for the journey."

The journey is the leaving of this life for the next. In

this aspect of the sacrament, Holy Communion is brought to those who are in their last weeks or days here on Earth. The grace that comes from receiving Holy Communion is given to help usher the dying person to the presence of God in Heaven. I would hope that if there is one thing that we could choose to take with us to the glories of Heaven, it would be the presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

The Commendation of the Dying are the final prayers that are said for the person who will soon die. These prayers involve readings from Sacred Scripture, the recitation of the Litany of Saints and a prayer to commend their soul to almighty God. This is the last act that the Church can do for her members who are leaving this life.

Hopefully, this has brought some clarity and insight into this sacrament. Now, I ask you to not wait until the "last minute" to request the sacrament. Sometimes, a priest may not be available. It is preferred that you call while the dying person is alert and can participate in the administration of the sacrament, this way they can have the peace of mind they need to enter into God's Kingdom.

Promises Made, Promises Kept

All too often promises are made, but not kept. Promises are broken for many reasons: because something more important gets in the way; or the ability to fulfill the promise was more difficult to complete than originally thought; or simply because the promisor had no intention of keeping the promise from the start.

Some promises are made with the intention of helping others and with great emotion. A parent will promise a child something to make them happy and grateful. An employee will promise to accomplish a task in order to demonstrate their ability to complete tasks.

Our first reading from Deuteronomy is a "promise made." The Jewish people want to see God. He understands their request and tells Moses to tell the people He will do that. Speaking for God, Moses tells them that God will give them a prophet, one from among their own who will speak God's word. No longer will the people only hear the word of God, but they will see God in this prophet... PROMISE MADE!

Our Gospel this weekend from Mark shows a continuation of Jesus' ministry. In previous weeks, we have heard John the Baptist speaking of Jesus as "one greater than he." That he, John, is not the Messiah. This is confirmed by the Holy Spirit as Jesus emerges from the baptismal

waters. Jesus begins his ministry by choosing his followers and showing them signs. He shows these signs also as He teaches the people in the synagogue. The people are amazed at his ability, the fact He speaks with authority, and drives out an unclean spirit from a man possessed by a demon... PROMISE KEPT!

As Jesus continues His ministry, there are those who believe and those who deny that He is the Messiah. In Chapter 3 of Mark's gospel, Jesus' family even proclaims He is "out of His mind." Jesus' ministry is one of peril and persecution. Sometimes a promise made and fulfilled goes unbelieved and denied.

Our life is a journey of understanding God's message of love and fulfillment. God's promise to make Himself known still is not believed, even in our lifetime. Our relationship to Jesus through the sacraments and prayer gives us the understanding to accept that God does fulfill all His promises. The sacrifice of His Son's life, death, and resurrection is the fulfillment of the promise of Eternal Life.

Each and every Catholic in the Archdiocese of Hartford has been dispensed from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass by Archbishop Leonard P. Blair due to the potential danger of the coronavirus pandemic. In light of continued uncertainty regarding the extent and duration of the pandemic in the state of Connecticut, Archbishop Blair has now extended this dispensation from the Sunday obligation through Saturday, May 23, 2021.

The Archdiocese of Hartford continues to monitor the severity of the situation and will provide updates regarding decisions reached for the archdiocese as they are made.

Josephine Bakhita, whose Feast Day is February 8. Canonized by Pope St. John Paul II in 2000, St. Josephine was enslaved in Africa and Italy. Upon gain-



ing her freedom, she joined the Canossian Daughters of Charity and became an advocate for those enslaved.

Vatican: No Ashes on Foreheads this Ash Wednesday

VATICAN CITY (Catholic News Services) -- The Vatican Congregation for Divine Worship and the Sacraments asked priests to take special anti-COVID-19 precautions this year when distributing ashes on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17,

including sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads rather than using them to make a cross on people's foreheads.



The congregation's note on the distribution of ashes in time of pandemic" was published on the congregation's website Jan. 12 and directs priests to say "the prayer for blessing the ashes" and then sprinkle "the ashes with holy water, without saying anything.

"Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: 'Repent and believe in the Gospel' or 'Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return.'

"The priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places," it said. "The priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything."


The usual practice would be to repeat the formula -- "Repent and believe in the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" -- to each person as the ashes are sprinkled on the top of their head or rubbed onto their forehead.

Sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads, rather than marking foreheads with ashes, is the customary practice at the Vatican and in Italy. Given the spread of the coronavirus, the practice has the advantage of not requiring the priest to touch multiple people.






