

\*Advance sign-ups are required; we cannot take any walk-ins. See page 3 for sign up information. The Vatican has stated that ashes are to be sprinkled on the crown of the head. This avoids any physical contact.

#### Lenten Fast and Abstinence

Let us be inwardly renewed through the self-discipline of our lives, turning from worldly things to spiritual things. Let us deny ourselves, training for the spiritual battles before us.

#### Please note:

The ill and elderly are excused from these rules.

#### Ash Wednesday and Good Friday

Days of Fast and Abstinence: Abstain from eating meat and fast between meals. Limit of one full meal and two smaller meals for all aged 18-59. Catholics 14 and older do not eat meat but are allowed to eat eggs, milk products, and condiments made from animal fat.

#### How Do I Fast?

Fasting requires that those between the ages of 18-59 only eat one full meal per day. Two smaller meals may be taken during the day to maintain physical strength, but these two meals together do not equal a full meal as well as no eating between meals. Those not obliged to fast (under 18 or over 59) are encouraged to join in the discipline to the extent that they are able.

#### What is Abstinence?

Abstinence prohibits all those 14 years old and older from eating meat on Ash Wednesday (February 17), Good Friday (April 2) and all Fridays of Lent. This obligation continues throughout our lives. Those younger than 14 are encouraged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they can.

#### Fridays in Lent

Fridays in Lent are days of abstinence for all who have reached the age of 14. This means to abstain totally from meat. During the other weekdays of Lent, fasting is not mandatory. Voluntary acts of self-denial and sacrifice are recommended. We practice giving up something good, for something far better.

#### Did You Know?

Every Sunday is a mini celebration of the Resurrection, so we break our fast!

Praying this devotion is a special way to grow closer to our Lord by honoring His family every day throughout the month!


Holy Family of Nazareth, make our family one with you.

#### What Does Lent Mean to You?

A letter from Fr. Dillon

This week we begin the penitential season of Lent and many of us will take on some discipline of self-denial during these 40 days. There is always merit in practicing penitential acts as long as they are done for the right reason. Which begs the question: "What is the right

reason for practicing penitential acts?" The answer is very simple: so that we may draw closer to God and so that which is incompatible with God's way is uprooted from our life. Is this why you practice acts of denial during Lent? If not, then what is your reason?

This year, Ash Wednesday will be celebrated a bit differently than in years past. We're all accustomed to having the ashes placed upon our foreheads in the shape of a cross (often times it also looks more like a smudge). This year, so as to avoid physical contact, we'll be following the European practice of sprinkling ashes on the

crown of the head. Regardless of which method

of imposing ashes is used, the ashes are there to

remind us that we need to make changes in our

life so we may become closer to God and more

reflective of God's presence in our life. The ashes are a sign to the world that you want to change how you live so that your life is more conformed to God's way. Is this why you desire to receive

ashes?

The approach that too many people take regarding Lent is that it is a period of 40 days to endure until we go back to our old practices. Many use this season as a form of "Weight Watchers" in preparation for Spring. The approach that the Church asks us to take is to renew your faith, be conformed

anew to Jesus, and be forever changed by the penitential practices that you have adopted during this time. In reality, when the 40 days of Lent have concluded, we ought to see that something positive happened in our spiritual life, our relationship with the Lord, and in how we live our lives, for the remainder of our lives. What we begin now is not supposed to end. Is this your approach to Lent?

#### About the Mass: I Confess...

One form of the penitential rite at the beginning of Mass is the traditional *Confiteor*, or "I confess," a prayer that was formerly prayed by the priest alone at the foot of the altar, but which is now prayed by the entire assembly. The *Confiteor* is at once personal—"I confess"—and communal, prayed aloud, together.

We recognize that sin does not just separate us from God; sin comes between us and others, isolating us. We acknowledge that sin has many dimensions, individual and communal: sins of thought, sins of speech, sins of action, sins of omission. Sin is not something that happens to us; sin is something we do.

In the *Confiteor*, we take responsibility for our own actions. The repeated insistence on our "fault," with the ritual gesture of striking the breast, an ancient sign of penitence, is not meant to lower our self-esteem. Rather, it acknowledges our human instinct to transfer the blame whenever we can ("The devil made me do it!"). This prayer stops us short. We take responsibility for ourselves, our actions, our failure to act. Then we cry out to God in those ancient words, *Kyrie*, *eleison*—Lord, have mercy. For the sinner who repents, there is mercy.

This truth is at the heart of our faith, and it is where the Mass, our feast of faith, begins.

#### St. Valentine and His Day

The Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time coincides with Valentine's Day this year. Few of us know much about the origins of this day which celebrates the people we love. Was there really a St. Valentine or was it an invention of the candy, flower and greeting card industry?

A search online of Wikipedia and the Encyclopedia Britannica list St. Valentine as a martyred priest from Northern Rome in the early part of the 3rd Century. Wikipedia and the other sites show he is the patron saint of beekeepers and victims of epilepsy. Relics of the saint do exist and the Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran and Orthodox Churches all celebrated his feast day. He was removed as a saint of the Catholic Church in 1969 because little verifiable information about him was available.

Wikipedia reports the following legends attributed to St. Valentine. It is said that Valentine, a priest, defied the order of the emperor Claudius and secretly performed Christian weddings for couples, allowing the husbands involved to escape service in the pagan army. The account mentions that in order "to remind these men of their vows and God's love, St. Valentine is said to have cut hearts from parchment" giving them to these Christians, a possible origin of the widespread use of hearts. Another legend is that Valentine refused to sacrifice to pagan gods. Being imprisoned for this, Valentine gave his testimony in prison and through his prayers, healed the jailer's blind daughter. On the day of his execution, he left her a note that was signed, "Your Valentine."

Whether these legends are authentic or not, they fit perfectly into our readings this weekend. Jewish law marked those sick with lep-

rosy as outcasts. They were to be separated from the general population physically and wear clothing



designating them as untouchable. Jesus' encounter with a leper in our gospel shows that He is sensitive to the needs of all people and shows no partiality to those who seek his help. He heals the leper which allows that person to return to community life. He tells the man not to tell anyone about his healing out of concern that the man will continue to be treated as an outcast. The man is so overjoyed with the love that is shown him by Jesus, he spreads the word, unconcerned about what people will think. Jesus embraces all; the outcast, the poor and the sinner.

This Wednesday is Ash Wednesday and begins the season of Lent. The next 40 days show the extent to which Jesus shows His love. It culminates in the ultimate sacrifice: giving His life for us. God's love is never ending, shownin Jesus' resurrection and a promise of life with Him for eternity. HAPPY VALENTINES DAY!!




