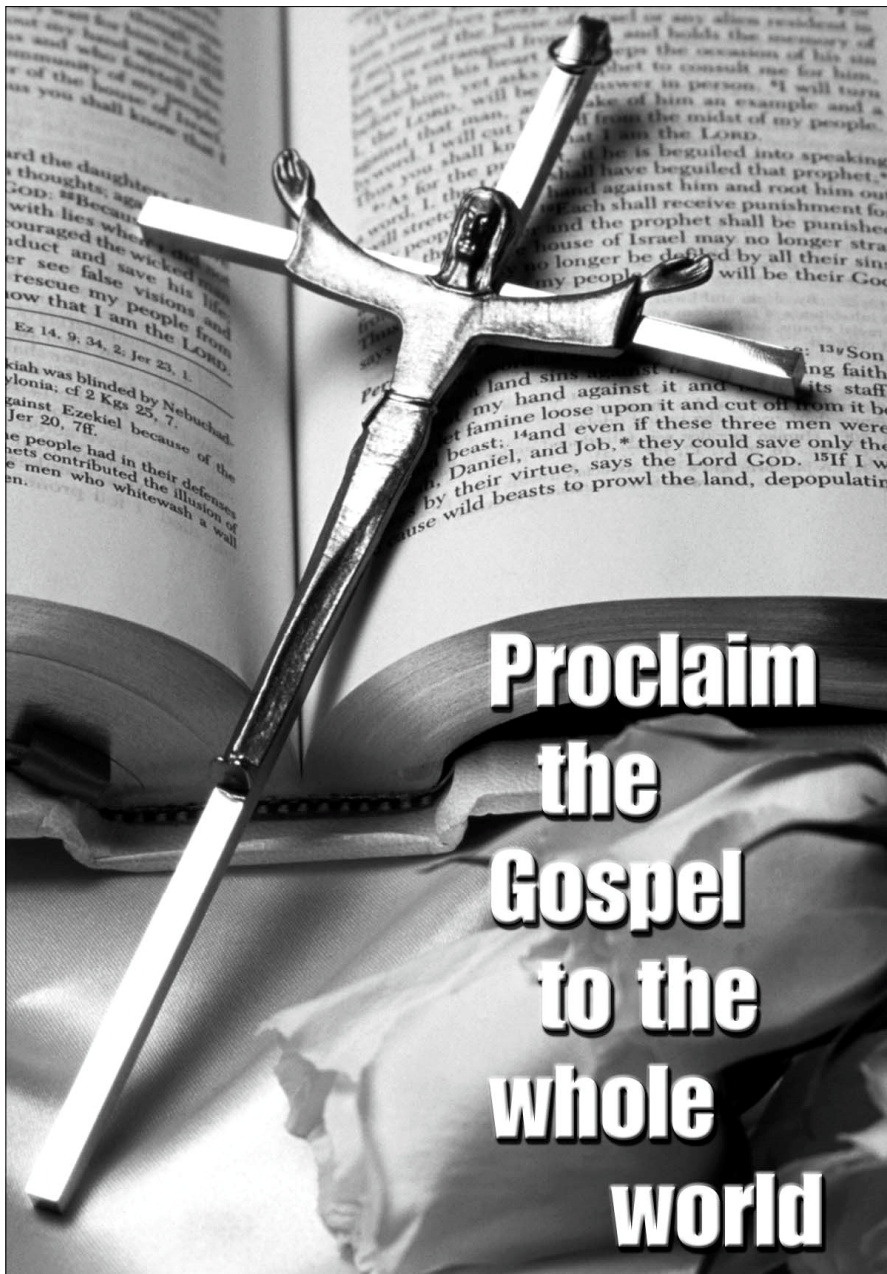

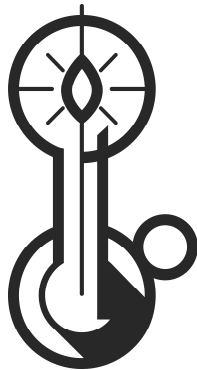

Together Again!

A letter from Fr. Dillon



Dear Parishioners,

We will soon come together again to praise and worship God! In response to the decision by the Governor to ease COVID-19 restrictions, the Archbishop has issued these guidelines to be used for Mass. (*Note: The following is a condensed version of the guidelines.*)

- The general dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass in person on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is no longer in force. The Sunday Obligation resumes the weekend of May 22-23. If you are unable or afraid to return to Mass, we will still be livestreaming at 9:30 AM on Sundays.
- Masks are still required while inside.
- The Sacrament of Penance (Confessions) will be heard in the Reconciliation Room on Saturdays from 3-4 PM beginning on May 22.
- Missalettes will be placed in the pews.
- Congregational singing will now be allowed.
- Social distancing will no longer be required.
- There will no longer be sign-ups for Mass.
- All tape and post-it notes will be removed from the pews and floor.
- The Cry Room will be open for use by parents with young children only. This ought not be one's regular seat at Mass.
- There will be an entrance and exit procession.

- The Offertory Baskets at the end of the center aisle will remain in place at this time.
- Lectors and Extra-Ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion will resume their roles in June.
- The invitation to extend a Sign of Peace will resume with a no-contact exchange of peace.
- There will not be the distribution of the Precious Blood at this time.
- There will be no Offertory Procession to bring forth the gifts.

After reviewing the guidelines that have been issued, I believe these cover the realities that we face on a regular basis. I know for myself; this is a long-awaited moment. I'm very eager to see how many people will feel comfortable returning to church. I'm looking forward to being able to participate in the Mass through singing, and I hope that you will too. If you have been shy about singing in the past, we'll still be wearing masks and I think that makes all of us sound like better singers. Don't be bashful, show your love of God through singing His praises. We've come a long way since those early, dark and fear-filled days of the pandemic, so let's take advantage of this opportunity to celebrate! We can come together again and enthusiastically participate in our liturgies.

Selfless Love

As children, we are often told by parents and other adults to share our toys and food with others. As we mature into adults, we know through Christ's example that we need to provide for others. The responsibility of taking care of spouses, children, elderly parents and relatives is ingrained in us so that it becomes second nature. Beyond the boundaries of close family and friends, selflessness in sharing with others begins to diminish -- not so much because we don't care, but our sense of obligation to those whom we do not know is often overshadowed by our own personal obligations. Sometimes, we do step out from under that shadow and become aware of and open our hearts to people in need. We share our money and resources, especially in times of difficulty. This past year during the pandemic, many people opened their hearts and pocketbooks to help those in need of food and housing, oftentimes living in far distant places. The devastating stories around our country and beyond our borders caused us to extend a helping hand during these unprecedented times. While our contributions were perhaps not as large as we would like them to be, they contributed to those from a large number of people worldwide who remembered the voices of their parents telling them to share their resources.

Our Gospel is an example of selfless love well beyond the example that we learned as children. In John's Gospel, Jesus, in the company of His disciples, begins to pray to God. He prays not only for His followers, but all peoples, including those who will persecute and murder Him. The amazing part about this prayer is that it comes just prior to Jesus' arrest and the denial by Peter. Jesus has already told Peter that he would deny Him and that He would be betrayed by another, arrested and killed. Jesus is fully aware of the be-

trayal and desertion, yet He prays for them and others. Rather than pray for Himself, the prayer is for the unity of all of God's children; selfless love beyond human expectation.

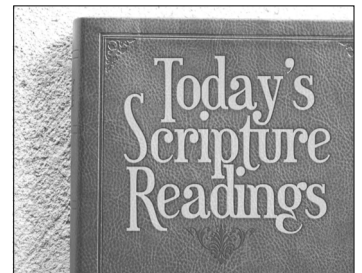
This past week we celebrated Jesus' Ascension into Heaven. The process is complete! Jesus has given us an example of how to love God. He has demonstrated God's unending mercy for our sins and opened the way to Eternal life. Jesus' life, death and resurrection showed us the way. As we come to the end of this Easter season, we must ask ourselves how much of what Jesus has shown us has now become part of our life? And, are we truly understand-

ing of the promise of our own resurrection? Jesus, by His cross and resurrection, has selflessly given us the gift of life for all eternity.

In My Father's house there are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and welcome you into My presence, so that you also may be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going."... (Jn 14:3)

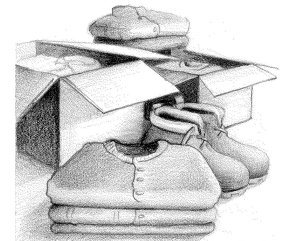

Learning About the Mass:

The General Intercessions

The general intercessions were restored to the liturgy in the reforms that followed the Second Vatican Council. In these prayers—also known as the “universal prayer” or “prayer of the faithful”—the assembly prays for the Church, the world, and the local community. As the name “prayer of the faithful” reminds us, these intercessions are a privilege of the baptized, which is why any catechumens are dismissed before the Creed and the intercessions. In baptism, we become members of a royal priesthood, and what do priests do? They intercede; they pray. In standing to pray to God as a community, we are living out our royal priesthood.

The intercessions at Mass usually follow a clear pattern, moving from general to specific needs. We pray for the whole Church. We pray for the world and for our nation. We pray for our local community, for those who have died and for all the sick and afflicted. In our united prayer, we reach beyond ourselves and our own needs and grow in awareness of and compassion for the needs of others.

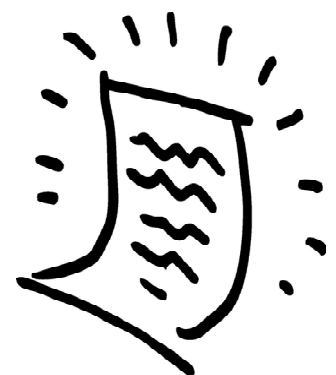

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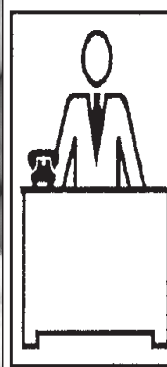
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
