Offering What We Have to God

A Note from Fr. Landback

The Gospel this weekend presents us with a turning point in the ministry of Jesus the Messiah: the multiplication of the “loaves and fishes.” A crisis has come about because thousands of people have followed Jesus to a remote spot and there is no apparent way to feed all of them.

Everything about this event reminds us of the miraculous rescue of the Hebrew people from the yoke of slavery in Egypt. In fact, the passage refers to Passover directly. Everything that follows evokes the Exile, which included the miraculous feeding of the people in the desert with manna, the Bread of Heaven. But as Christians, especially as Catholics, we also recognize that the Holy Eucharist is also clearly being foreshadowed.

At the critical moment, a boy comes forward offering the food he has brought: five barley loaves and two fish. Here, in a nutshell, we have the act of Christian worship, or as we Catholics say, “sacrifice.” Our worship involves a deliberate weekly offering up of our lives to God. The “Offertory” is that moment in the Mass

when we are invited to do just this: to put everything we are and everything we have at the disposal of God. This is the “leap of faith” for us.



When the boy does this, God does something quite amazing and uncanny: He multiplies its effects. The same thing happens when we offer to God our lives and our substance. He multiplies what we offer in ways that we can scarcely imagine.

Learning About the Mass **The Preface Dialogue**

“Lift up your hearts.” “We lift them up to the Lord.” “Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.” “It is right to give him thanks and praise.” With this ancient dialogue we enter the Eucharistic Prayer, the heart of the Mass. These venerable words have been part of the Christian liturgy almost from the beginning—by the time of Hippolytus of Rome (c. 215) they were already fixed in the liturgy.

Several times during the Mass the priest has invited us to pray. There is something different here. We are invited to be “lifted up,” to ascend, to climb the Lord’s mountain, as it were, to go to a new place for this most solemn part of the Mass. And we are invited to a new frame of mind, a sense of joy, of focused dedication: our hearts must not be cast down, but lifted up, and lifted to the Lord. Why? Because we are going to give thanks—we are going to “eucharist!” It is right and just that we do this.

The Inconvenience of Caring for Others

Yes, you have read the title of this reflection correctly. It is seldom a convenient time for us when others reach out for help. There is always something more important that we have to do and besides, “once I get involved, it may mean that there will be other times when they call upon me to help.”

All of us, at some time or another, have found ourselves uttering these words. There is never a convenient time because there is always something that needs to be done. Helping others in their time of need can create conflict. Many reasons come to mind when rationalizing why I should not help. One of the reasons is that we put our needs ahead of others. In a way that is only natural; we do need to take care of ourselves first. Conflict in these situations is also created by not knowing what we can do to help. Perhaps the answer lies in the fact that we fail to trust that God will help us to help others.

Much of scripture tells us that God will provide for us when we are in need. So, wouldn't God help us by giving us the gifts we need to care for others? It sounds like a WIN-WIN, God helping us to help others.

Our readings this weekend continue the readings of previous weeks by showing us a compassionate, caring and loving God who expects us to care for each other. Our first reading tells the story of the prophet Elisha, a follower of the prophet Elijah. Elisha was a caring and compassionate person who sought to care for the people entrusted to him. Our story in the first reading compliments our Gospel reading this weekend concerning the feeding of many.

St. Paul, in a reading from the Letter to the Ephesians, pleads to the people of Ephesus to strive for unity among their community. He

stresses the need for patience, meekness and humility. He tells us we must use the Gifts of the Holy Spirit to meet the needs of the community. Only in acknowledging God's love for us can people meet the needs of their brothers and sisters, creating a community of peace and love.

Our Gospel from St. John is the familiar story of Jesus feeding the multitudes. It is a story



that appears in all four of the Gospels. Perhaps initially we may think, “gee, that's another nice miracle by Jesus.” As we hear it repeatedly, we may take it for granted that this was what Jesus did -- perform miracles. What we need to realize is that Jesus' miracles are actually a call for us to use His example to reach

out whenever possible to meet the needs of others. To allow the Holy Spirit to guide us to help those who are in need.

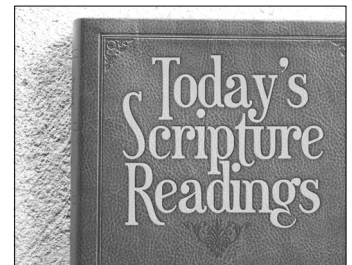
If we look at all of Jesus' miracles, they were not always at a convenient time. In fact, the needs of others come in the midst of other things that Jesus is trying to do. Yes, caring for others is at times inconvenient, but it is God's call for us to step back from our busy lives to be part of the body of Christ and to unify ourselves as children of God and brothers and sisters in Christ.

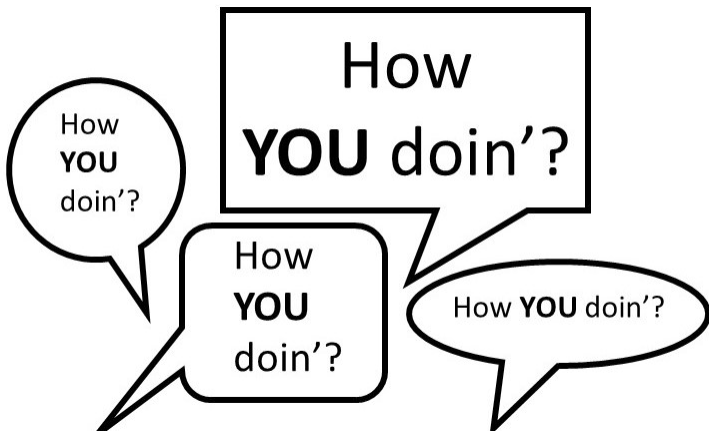
Sunday's Readings: July 25
