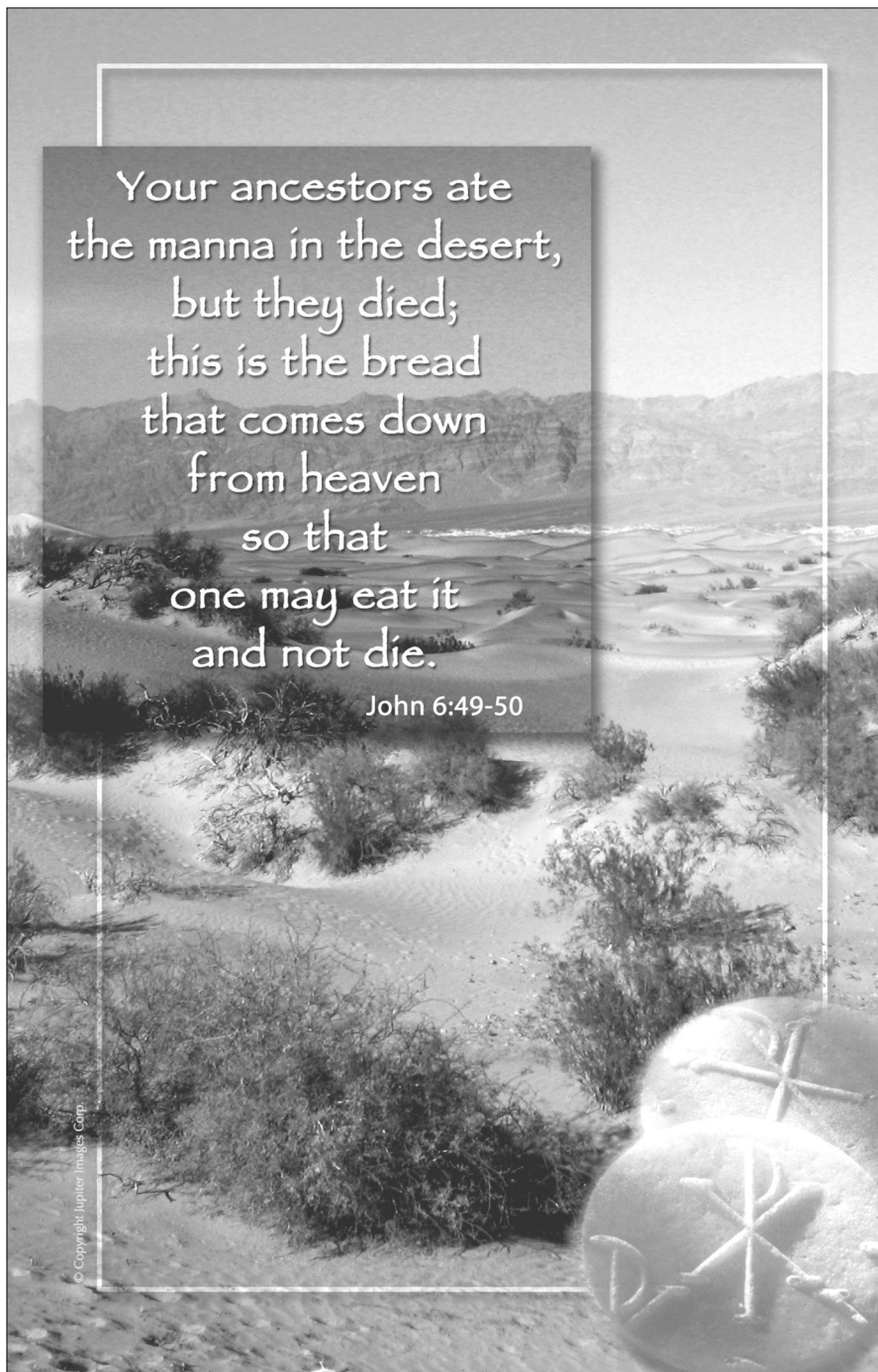

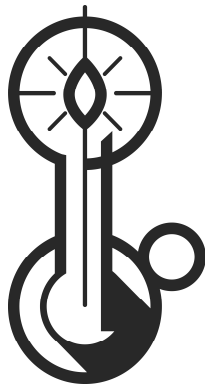

An Infusion of Eternal Life

A Note from Fr. Landback

This Sunday we hear more of the dialogues that Jesus had the day after feeding the 5,000, when He had crossed the Galilean Sea back to Capernaum. Today's Gospel begins with the murmuring of the "Jews" (religious leaders from Jerusalem). Their objection to Jesus "coming down from Heaven": "How can he say, 'I have come down from heaven'? We know his parents." It is true that Jesus was known on the human level, coming from a particular place, Nazareth. This seemed to them to remove all possibility of His being the Divine Messiah. In this, they made a common assumption that God uses only supernatural processes, not natural ones like human beings. In fact, He works supremely through both.

Looking at today's second reading, we know that people often encounter God not directly but indirectly, through the surprising acts of kindness or forgiveness of fellow human beings. St. Paul encourages us to "be imitators of God...live in love." In this way, others may glimpse the presence of God in us. Are you allowing God to manifest Himself in your life in this way?

Jesus minimizes the guilt of the religious leaders for refusing to believe in Him. He says, "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him." This is an important faith lesson: that our coming to believe in Jesus is not something we do all by ourselves. In fact, it

would not happen at all without God's help. First, He must get our attention. Even though God's truth is written deep within us, we grow up learning to ignore it. We learn to put our faith in ourselves, in the opinions of other people, or in getting things, getting ahead, getting our way. Through the circumstances of our lives — especially when something doesn't work out for us — God can begin to gently guide us (back) to the truth. The desire for the truth helps us to come to Jesus.

Like manna in the desert, Jesus - the Bread from Heaven - gives life to our shriveled souls. Eternal life begins now, even in this life. We begin to taste heaven as we embrace the truth of God that is in Jesus Christ. Receiving the Sacrament of Holy Communion is nothing less than receiving an infusion of eternal life into our lives, sustaining and preparing us, one day, to face death with hope.

Jesus ends this part of His teaching by saying, "the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." He connects the bread that He will give to His death on the Cross. The death of God the Son means life for the human race. We should be careful not to be too narrow in our thinking about the Bread of Life. Receiving Jesus conveys all the fullness of God.

Comfort Food and the Living Bread

As we slowly emerge from the pandemic and return to our normal activities of work and social gatherings, many important studies are beginning to emerge as to how our lifestyle habits changed during this time. Insulated from the outside world, we turned to electronic devices for social and business contacts. One such habit was the overwhelming strain on the strength of electronic bandwidth. Many families with children doing school work and parents working from home complained of the weak bandwidth that slowed the use of their electronic devices.

Another issue was the shortage of some foods, including the ingredients to make basic food products. Two such products were yeast and flour -- many grocery store chains had little to sell. When it did appear on the shelves, it was quickly whisked away by shoppers who hoarded it. Many media outlets are now reporting that the increased demand for baking ingredients during the height of the pandemic rose more than 50% in the categories of baked goods and bread. Consumption of these foods increased substantially and, with the additional time at home, many began to bake to fill both time and stomachs.

Comfort foods became the satisfying means by which we endured the captive nature of our existence. They soothed our anxiety and fears amidst the grim news. As most comfort foods are filled with carbohydrates, they tend to make us drowsy and lethargic. Easing the distress of this “new normal.”

In our first reading today, anxiety and distress are not new emotions for the prophet Elijah. He prays for death and is distraught and tired. He prays to God that even though he has helped his people and suffered ridicule, he is no better off than the Jewish people God led out of slavery. They continually sought the comfort of other gods, never truly embracing the God of Moses. Elijah, seeking to die, instead is given food by God and told to eat by an angel. The food was to strengthen his resolve for the time

ahead. Just as God provided food for the Jewish people in their exodus in the desert, so God provides nourishment for Elijah and those that embrace Him, no matter how they may waver in their faith.

Jesus, in our Gospel this weekend, refers to Himself as the “living bread.” Many look at Jesus and comment that this cannot be true. He is Joseph, the carpenter's son. He's an ordinary villager just like them. “How can (Jesus) claim to come down from heaven?” they ask.

Sometimes we are blind to God in our life because we expect an extraordinary sign which announces God's presence. In fact, God makes His presence known in the most ordinary ways. Scripture repeatedly demonstrates that God has chosen the most ordinary of people to be his heralds. Despite feeling anxiety and distress in their lives, God feeds the chosen ones and nourishes them, giving them the strength to continue on.

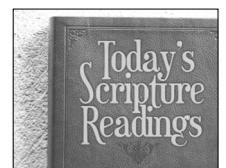
Jesus, the “living bread” given to us in the Eucharist, provides ordinary people with what we need to proclaim God's presence in the world. St. Paul's statement that we must be imitators of Christ does not mean we will be free of anxiety and distress. There will always be those who do not share your faith and may even ridicule you. The Eucharist which we receive is the “comfort food” that will get us through. We must hold tight to our faith and God's nourishment to sustain us in difficult times.

Sunday's Readings: August 8

First Reading — After resting and taking nourishment twice, Elijah is strengthened to walk to the mountain of God, Horeb (1 Kings 19:4-8).

Second Reading — Be sealed by the Holy Spirit of God so as to be imitators of God and live in love (Ephesians 4:30 — 5:2).

Gospel — Jesus professes that He is the living bread and whoever eats this bread will live forever (John 6:41-51).
