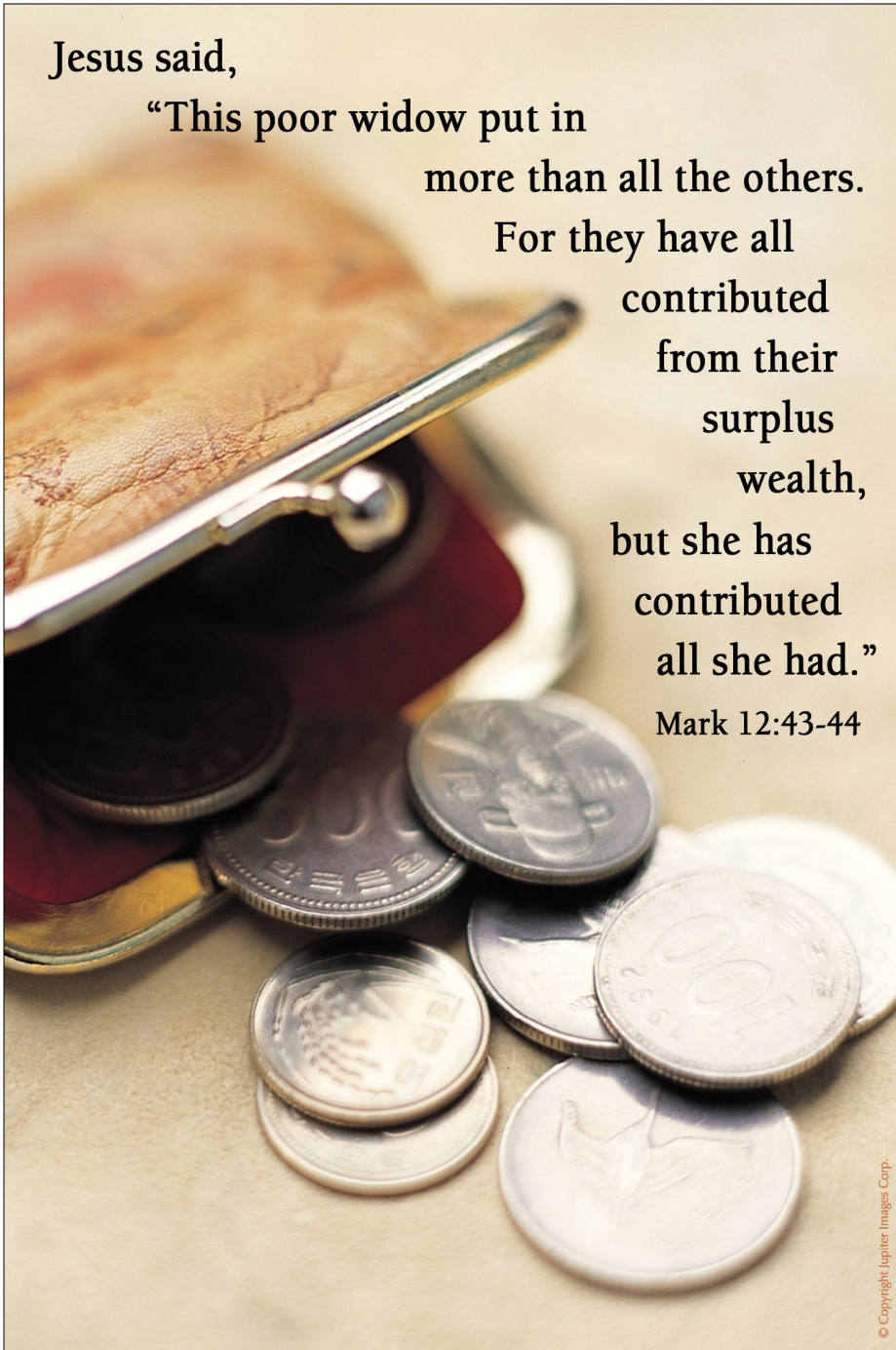

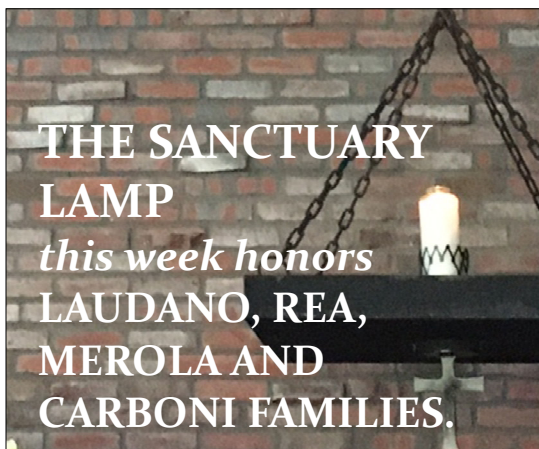

Counting Our Blessings

A Note from Fr. Landback, Administrator

As we begin the month of November, it seems to me to be an entire month for giving thanks for God's goodness. We begin the month with the observance of All Saints and All Souls Days. These feast days are opportunities for us to give thanks for the holy people that God has



used to inspire and to pray for us. We, in turn, pray for the beloved dead that they may enter into glory with Jesus Christ and all the saints. As we pray for the dead, we may be prompted by the Spirit to forgive any wrongs that they – or

we — have done, which clouded our own relationship with that person. Yes, there is forgiveness across death!

In November, we also give thanks – as a civil observance – for our veterans, living and deceased, who were willing to put their lives on the line for ours. At Thanksgiving, we give thanks to God that we live in a country — though imperfect — that was established on the principle that all human beings are created by God with equal worth. And, we have rights that come from God and are not to be denied, “among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.”

Toward the very end of November, we begin the season of Advent, which prompts us to give thanks for the Christ Child, “God with us,” who brought salvation into the world through His offering of Himself. This salvation is none other than the forgiveness of our sins and the power to gradually to overcome them through the grace of the Holy Spirit.

Among the blessings that I am counting this year, is the opportunity to be among you and to serve as a priest and as your Parish Administrator. May God grant all of us a spirit of gratitude this month - for all of our blessings!

The Saturday morning Mass, which is our best attended weekday Mass, will be moved to 8:00 AM in hopes of attracting even more worshippers.

Medals on the Soul

Gino Bartali was the most renowned Italian cyclist before World War II, having won the Tour de France in 1938 and numerous Italian races. It emerged in December 2010 that Bartali had hidden a Jewish family in his cellar and, according to one of the survivors, saved their lives in doing so. Despite harassment and threats to his life, he continued to help Jews avoid arrest.

He used his cycling fame to carry messages and documents to the Italian Resistance -- from Florence through Tuscany, Umbria, and Marche, many times traveling as far afield as Assisi, wearing the racing jersey emblazoned with his name. The German troops refused to search him fearing discontent among Italians fans. Many of the documents and messages were rolled and hidden away in his bicycle.

With the help of the Archbishops of Genoa and Florence, the Franciscan Friars of Assisi and others, Bartali saved the lives of an estimated 800 Jews and he did not reveal what he had done. Even after the war, he never boasted about his good deeds. He used to say, "The good is done, but it is not said. And certain medals hang on the soul, not on the jacket." After the war, Bartali returned to his wife and young children and continued to cycle and win races for Italy. He died in 2000 at the age of 85.

Making a sacrifice for the good of others occurs every day. People make sacrifices that oftentimes are beyond even their means. For example, the sacrifices made by our medical responders during the pandemic were heroic at best. Often endangering themselves and their own families, they exposed themselves to potential death in providing medical aid for people afflicted with the COVID-19 virus. Many lived away from their families for extended periods of time to protect them while continuing to expose themselves to the virus.

Our readings this weekend focus on the sacrifices that people make to give aid to others. The story of Elijah is one of trust and self-sacrifice. Even though the widow showed some

resistance to his request, she ultimately relented and provided Elijah with the food needed for him to survive. Elijah, "as the Lord had foretold" through him, made sure the widow and her son had the means to continue to provide food for themselves.

Our Gospel this weekend begins with Jesus speaking out against people who use their wealth to promote themselves so others can acknowledge their high position in life. He teaches His disciples the true meaning of sacrifice using the occasion of a widow placing two small, copper coins in the treasury. He emphasizes that it is not so much the amount of the sacrifice, but the heart of the contributor who wants to help others in their need.

As we saw in our Gospel last week, the love of God is displayed in humility to give aid to the needs of others. Saying we love God while ignoring the needs of our neighbor cannot be considered love of God.

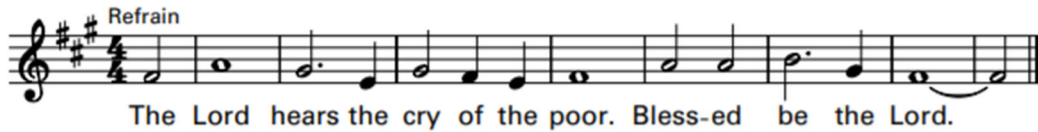

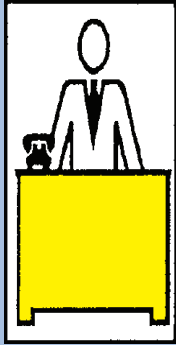

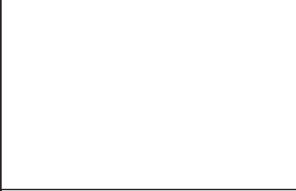
