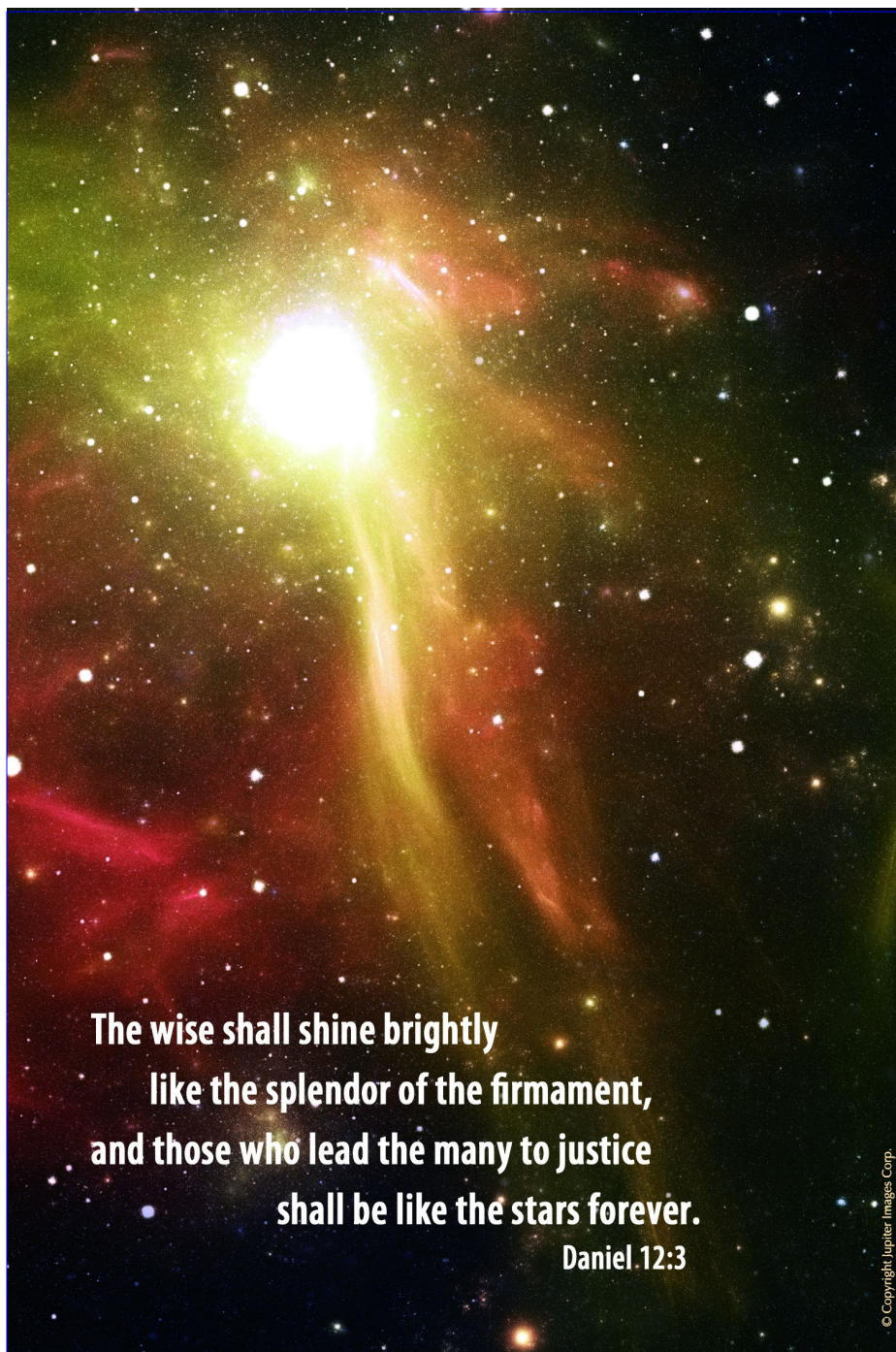

Beginnings and Endings

A Note from Fr. Landback, Administrator

Do you have a favorite movie or story? What makes it a “good” movie or story? Isn’t it the ending? The ending brings to fulfillment the potential and resolves the underlying motivations and conflicts. If it is a drama, the battle of good and evil ends with the vindication of the good and justice for those whose purposes were evil. If it is a romantic comedy, the two lovers end up overcoming obstacles, become better for it, and “live happily ever after.” It is clear that in this week’s Scriptures, the story of Creation and the End, is pictured as a drama, but also has elements of romantic comedy.

First, the drama: Things are moving to their culmination. As there was a beginning, so there will be an end. In the meantime, we human beings live against a backdrop of the conflict between good and evil. Sometimes this is experienced intensely at the end of a person’s life.

In Daniel and in the words of Jesus, we learn that “tribulation” will precede the end of our world. This tribulation is pretty much always with us, but will reach a terrible crescendo before the end of the world: persecution of the faithful, false messiahs, and false prophets misleading the vulnerable. Jesus assures us that if we hold onto the truth for goodness’ sake, we do not have to fear this because He will be there. (He promises to be there at the end of our individual lives also!) There will be a great sorting out of human motivations, the truth and falsity of human hearts is finally revealed once and for all. This is the Last Judgment.

Just as sometimes people may have a premonition of their death, Jesus tells us that the world will be able to recognize the signs of the End. He urges us to persevere: Seek what is truly good and reject the evil around us that sometimes seems smarter or more powerful than goodness. It is very challenging: to be chaste in times that are unchaste, to live simply in times of excess, to remain pure of heart when there is so much evil, and to pursue harmony in the midst of so much hatred.

Let us not be discouraged by this, or by our own failings, but let Jesus consecrate us by His one offering on the cross! By His grace, let us resolve to be there with Him at the End and to be united with all those who seek God.

How is it like a romantic comedy? The Second Coming of Christ is a wedding feast. The Bridegroom (Jesus) claims His Bride (those who have chosen the good) and “they live happily ever after.”

Bounty: If You Have It, Please Share It

In 2016, Pope Francis designated the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time as “World Day of the Poor.” In his Apostolic Letter, “*Misericordia et Misera*,” he writes: “It will be a day that will help communities and each baptized person to reflect on how poverty is at the heart of the Gospel and on the fact that, as long as Lazarus lies at the door of our homes (Lk a6:19-21) there can be no justice or social peace. This day will represent a genuine form of new evangelization (Mt 11:5) which can renew the face of the Church as she perseveres in her perennial activity of pastoral conversion and witness to mercy.”

During the pandemic, poverty increased dramatically worldwide as the result of people losing their jobs and the interruption of the supply chain, which distributes food to nations originally at the lower economic levels. The World Bank in July 2021 says that an additional 97 million people have entered into poverty since 2019. World Vision, a Christian organization working to end poverty, says that 689 million people worldwide live in extreme poverty (less than \$1.90 a day). The World Bank continues that the global economy is contracting rather than expanding and is pushing many in the middle class into poverty.

As we approach the end of the liturgical year, we begin to look forward to the Feast of Christ the King, Advent, and Christmas. Our readings this weekend emphasize the great power in which God will bestow on His Son. The reading from the Prophet Daniel speaks in terms of greatness and being the guardian of the people. Daniel reflects on God’s promise of Eternal Life when he says, “Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake and shall live forever... But the wise shall shine brightly... and those who lead the many to justice shall be like the stars forever.” The author in Hebrews contrasts the offering of Jesus’ life as incomparable to any priestly offering ever made. By this one offering of His life for sin Jesus has made perfect those who dedicated themselves to living the

gospel message in their lifetimes.

As I read the Gospel of the fig tree, I was reminded of my grandfather and how meticulously he tended to his fig and lemon trees. They produced an abundance of fruit that the whole family enjoyed. Jesus uses the story of the fig tree as a teaching moment to remind the disciples of being productive in life. With Christ as our example, we, as disciples, must bear good fruit by sharing God’s love. As in the example of the cursed fig tree which withered, our life without fruitfulness shares nothing with our brothers and sisters. We are called to bear a bountiful harvest of good fruit so we can nourish each other and spread the harvest of love.

As we approach the end of the liturgical year, we celebrate the bounty of the harvest that God provided through our hard work this past summer. Thanksgiving is a celebration for this bounty. As we enter this holiday season, many families are still mired in the ravages brought about by the COVID-19 virus and downturn in world economies. Our help and generosity, in whatever amount we can spare, is a selfless act in the tradition of the Gospel message. As Jesus fed thousands, He gave us an example of our call to also provide for those in need. The Eucharist is the spiritual nourishment which provides us with the grace to reach out to those in need and bear much fruit.





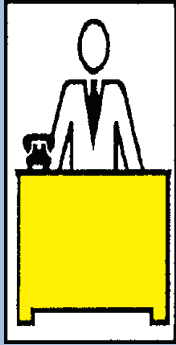
